

The Queen was born at 17, Bruton Street in Mayfair, London. Not a palace or a big estate or even a hospital, but a townhouse on a busy London street. Her parents had moved into the house, belonging to her Scottish grandparents, the Earl and Countess of Strathmore, only a few weeks before her birth. It is now a Cantonese restaurant called Hakkasan.

As a British passport is issued in the name of Her Majesty, it is unnecessary for The Queen to possess one. All other members of the Royal Family, including The Duke of Edinburgh and The Prince of Wales, have passports

Answer A: No

The Queen may have been to 116 countries around the world - but one thing she never has to pack is her passport. ... But a passport isn't the only official document the Queen is never required to have. The 95-year-old has never had a driving licence because they too are issued in her name.

Buckingham Palace (Mon-Fri most weeks), Windsor Castle (most weekends plus other times), Sandringham House (Christmas to Feb), Holyroodhouse Palace, Edinburgh (official duties in Scotland - Holyrood Week in July is the main time), Balmoral Castle, Scotland (Aug & Sept) and Hillsborough Castle, Northern Ireland (official duties in Northern Ireland).

Answer A: Greece

The Queen herself has never been to Greece as monarch though she did visit Athens before ascending to the throne. The Greeks overthrew and abolished their monarchy in 1973 which affected Prince Philip's immediate family and his father in particular. She has also not visited other European countries such as Albania, Andorra, Belarus, Bulgaria, Georgia, Ukraine, Montenegro or Monaco as well as Argentina, Bhutan, Cuba, Israel and Madagascar amongst others.

Q12: Which way does the Queen's head face on British coins?

A: Left B: Right C: It varies by coin

Answer B: Right

The Queen's head faces to the right on coins but to the left on stamps. Since the time of Charles II, the direction in which the monarch's head faces on coins has changed with every succeeding monarch. The same does not apply to stamps - the monarch always faces left.

The only exception to this rule was Edward VIII. He should have been a right-facer, but insisted on facing left. It never caused a problem, though. As he was only king for 10 months his coins were never issued (though a few were minted.) When George VI took over, he faced the way he would have done if Edward VIII had faced right. In other words, left. So when his daughter became Elizabeth II, she faced right.

Louis XIV⁴ (5 Sept 1638 – 1 Sept 1715), also known as Louis the Great or the Sun King, was King of France from 14 May 1643 until his death in 1715. His reign of 72 years and 106 days is currently the longest recorded of any monarch of a sovereign country in history.

William IV became King in June 1830 aged 64 yrs 10 mths and 5 days. Prince Charles is now 73.

Answer A: Diamond

A diamond jubilee celebrates the 60th anniversary of a significant event. The term is also used for 75th anniversaries, although the human lifespan makes this usage more common for institutions.
